FILLING OUR **CLASSROOM**WITH **RESPONSIBILITY**


According to the Random Acts of Kindness
Foundation, **RESPONSIBILITY** means being
reliable to do the things that are expected or
required of you. At school, your student/s are
going to talk about what responsibility means
and how they can show more responsibility.
There are many things preschoolers are
responsible for, even at such a young age. We
will talk about the different things that we are
responsible for at school, at home, and in our
communities. The goal is to help students
remember what it means to be responsible and
to give them a chance to practice being
responsible.

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Showing Responsibility

This month we are talking about **responsibility** and what that means for us at school, at home, and in our communities.


To start, ask your students if they know the definition of **responsibility**. What does responsibility mean to you in your preschool classroom? This can be a big concept for young kids, so you help kids connect the classroom jobs you likely have for them with being responsible. What is a weather watcher responsible for? What is a line leader responsible for? What other responsibilities or jobs do students have at school? (Examples: picking up after playtime, lining up quietly, or hanging up coats after recess.) Having responsibilities is like having a job or tasks to complete. The stories in this unit will help kids recognize that in order for things to work well - at home, at school, and in our community - we must be responsible and do what is asked or expected of us. Have students think about all the ways they show responsibility at preschool.

Curriculum Quick Guide

Cycle 1: Ages 3-4; Cycle 2: Ages 4-5; Cycle 3: Ages 5-6

Each week there is a story centered on the kindness concept and corresponding activities that span the curriculum: math & science, citizenship & social studies, music & movement. Each week you can choose whichever activities you feel your class would enjoy the most. There is also an optional project at the end of each week. Each concept has 4 weeks worth of stories and activities to enjoy. Additionally, each week you will meet one of our RAK animals who will help guide you through the materials through fictional stories (as part of our citizenship element).
